The American Revolution

Titus Laney's sons <u>TITUS</u>, <u>SAMUEL</u>, <u>WILLIAM</u>, <u>PETER</u>, <u>JOSEPH</u>, and <u>GEORGE</u> all served in the Revolutionary War. According to the Laney Historical Marker in Union County, North Carolina, Titus Laney and his wife Hannah sailed from Ireland to Philadelphia c.1732. Settled in Lancaster County., PA 1733; Settled in Frederick Co., VA 1742; Settled permanently in Lancaster Co., SC 1752. Known children: Anna, Titus, Samuel, William, Catherine, Peter, Joseph and George. All sons were patriots in the Revolution."

<u>EPHRAIM PARMLEE</u> served as a Private for Wilkes County in the North Caroline line. His name appears on a list of soldiers Dec. 2, 1785, who were to receive military land warrants. He received 640 acres in Sumner County, Tenn., on Bledsoes Creek.

The United States' Civil War

<u>ELIAS BARBEE</u>, on the 19th of October, 1861, offered his services to the government, enlisting in the Union army as a member of Company K, Forty-ninth Illinois Volunteer Infantry. In 1862, at Camp Butler, Illinois, he was taken ill, which resulted in his total blindness and led to his honorable discharge from the service on the 30 th of April, 1862, at Camp Stanton, Tennessee.

<u>DANIEL BARBEE</u> and <u>EDWARD BARBEE</u> also served the Union army as members of company K, Forty-ninth Illinois Volunteer Infantry.

<u>James Madison Judkins Manning</u> was the first child of William Madison and Lucy Ann (Judkins) Manning born on May 21, 1837 in Stewart County, Tennessee. Later, his family

At age twenty-four, he enlisted in the Confederate Army at Camp Boone, near Clarksville, Tennessee, on August 1, 1861. He served with Company H of the 3rd Kentucky Mounted Infantry under General Nathan Bedford Forrest. James Madison and his brother, Charles Gee Tatum Manning

, stayed and fought together for most of the four years of the War, engaging in battles at Shiloh, Vicksburg, Lookout Mountain, Corinth, Chickamauga, and many other important engagements in Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana.
